Everyone Wins with Return-to-Work

A return-to-work (RTW) process can help reduce the costs of workplace accidents for employers and injured workers.

When workers are injured, employers must pay overtime to other workers or hire extra help to make up for lost production. Meanwhile, injured workers who are idle may get depressed, stressed or bored. Their job skills suffer, along with their income, and they may have difficulty returning to full employment.

During 2016, Texas Oil & Gas

Association Workers' Comp Safety Group enjoyed a safer year with fewer injuries and reduced costs. Compared to 2015, the number of injury claims and costs declined by about 20 percent and 50 percent, respectively.

The most common causes of injury impacting the Safety Group involve strains, slip/trip/falls, struck-by incidents and motor vehicle crashes. Together, these injuries account for roughly 60 percent of all work-related injuries. Burns and motor vehicle crashes cause the greatest levels of human suffering and costs.

To provide a more in-depth look at these injury trends and associated hazards, Texas Mutual Insurance published two new companion reports "<u>Common Industry Hazards</u>" and "<u>Common Control</u> <u>Strategies</u>." These reports help members understand what's behind these trends and provide a blueprint to keep workers safe.

Looking Forward

Future newsletters will address a number of growing concerns for the Safety Group. Motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of fatalities among oil and gas workers. Fatigue, distracted driving, texting, speeding and failure to use seatbelts are major contributors to this problem. New worker training and lax job safety analysis are also factors leading to high injury rates and associated costs.
